- Performance and Accountability Review (PAR) scrutinises mid and end year reporting of performance
- PAR reports to Board priorities for improvement & invites input from the CPP Board
- This year was focused on closing off the Single Outcome Agreement (SOA) and setting the focus of the new performance management framework set out in the Community Plan
- 2018-19 will focus on establishing performance priorities for each of the Fairer East Ren themes

Areas of Performance Focus from last year – Child Poverty

The % of children living in low income families has decreased from 9.8% in 2014-15 to 8.2% in 2015-16.

Child poverty levels in deprived communities are decreasing at a similar level to East Renfrewshire as a whole.



Alternative statics estimate between that poverty rose between 2016 and 2018 and that there was a significant increase in poverty when housing costs are considered.

Child Poverty is one of our 5 Fairer East Ren key priority themes. The Delivery Plan focuses on maximising incomes and minimising costs for families.

New duties for ERC and Health Board in the Child Poverty Act

Performance has improved and will remain a key area of focus.

Ensuring we have meaningful community involvement

- 2017-18 presented exciting opportunities to develop community participation
 - Co-producing locality plans with locality planning steering groups, resulted in 2 locality plans in place in Barrhead.
 - We are in the early stages of engaging with communities and developing plans for Neilston and Thornliebank
 - Community Choices Budgeting in localities
 - In March 2017, we held our first Community Choices Budgeting event in Barrhead, covering the ADD2Barrhead and Auchenback Localities
 - Local residents voted to distribute £100,000 of funding to 32 local groups and organisations to run project linked to local communities

East Renfrewshire Community Planning Partnership's Performance and Accountability Review takes place at least twice a year. This brings together senior representatives from community planning partner agencies:

- East Renfrewshire Council
- East Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership
- Skills Development Scotland
- Scottish Enterprise
- Scottish Government
- Scottish Fire and Rescue Service
- West College Scotland
- Department for Work and Pensions

Summary of PAR Discussion

A key focus of the meeting is to ensure the performance of the Community Planning Partnership (CPP) is on track to meet agreed targets, review strategic approaches to drive transformational change and agree and monitor improvement actions.

This was the first meeting of the PAR since Fairer East Ren (our Local Outcomes Improvement Plan) and Locality Plans were approved in October. At the CPP Board meeting in June 2016, it was agreed that the CPP should continue to work towards the Single Outcome Agreement outcomes until a performance measurement framework was in place.

Community Planning Partners discussed performance against Strategic Outcome targets, for those indicators reported at mid-year. Almost all the indicators are on target or have exceeded targets. There are a few indicators which are not performing as well as expected and the PAR had discussions around these and identified actions as appropriate.

Strategic Outcome 1

- We are meeting our target with regard to the number of teenage pregnancies. Young Persons Services recently received a COSLA Gold award for their work in reducing teenage pregnancy in Auchenback.
- There has been an increase in the rate of stillbirths. It was highlighted that very small numbers in relation to still births can lead to large variations. HSCP is working with public health colleagues to improve.
- Improving breastfeeding in deprived areas remains a challenge. HSCP is currently investing in local services and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde has put in place additional integrated resources to work between hospital and community.

Strategic Outcome 2

- East Renfrewshire school pupils achieved their second best results to date on national examination results with 76% of S4 pupils achieving 5+ at L5. This is considerably higher (by 24.2%) than the Council's virtual comparator of 51.3%.
- East Renfrewshire school pupils achieved the best results to date on national examination results with 44%% of S6 pupils achieving 5+ at L6, this is 17% higher than our virtual comparator.

Strategic Outcome 3

- East Renfrewshire has the highest % of household waste that is recycled in Scotland.

Strategic Outcome 4

- There has been a substantial decrease in the number of fire fatalities and casualties, 64% lower than last year and well within target. The total number of primary fires (within a building/vehicle) and secondary fires (fires involving refuse/rubbish of no financial value) are also decreasing and within target.

Strategic Outcome 5

- We are performing slightly below target in terms of the percentage of time in the last 6 months of life in home or in a homely setting, however this is likely linked to our higher life expectancy rates and East Renfrewshire's continued inward migration of older people in the 90+ age bracket.

The PAR discussed our approach to the **next phase of development of the Community Plan, Fairer East Ren and our Locality Plans**. Over the course of the next few months a draft Community Plan will be developed and circulated to provide the overarching framework for the CPP's approach to improving the lives of local residents and work to develop the actions that will deliver on our outcomes will be undertaken by relevant partnership groups.

This work will build on the strong community participation during the development of the Fairer East Ren and locality plans and put in place robust action plans and an outcome measurement framework. This work will be overseen by the PAR and reported to the next CPP Board meeting.

The PAR agreed to send representatives to take part in a national action learning programme aimed at reflecting on and improving **community participation in the community planning process**.

Summary of PAR Discussion

A key focus of the meeting is to ensure the performance of the Community Planning Partnership (CPP) is on track to meet agreed targets, review strategic approaches to drive transformational change and agree and monitor improvement actions.

The PAR discussed the **Community Plan, which now includes Fairer East Ren**. There was an in-depth discussion on the strategic focus and direction of the plan and the PAR agreed a set of measures to track performance. The PAR recommended the Community Plan for consideration by the CPP Board on 25 June 2018.

Delivery Groups for each of the Fairer East Ren Intermediate Outcomes have now been identified and each provided the PAR with an update on progress to date on the development of **Delivery Plans**, which will be approved and published in the coming months.

The PAR was updated on the progress in the development and implementation of **Locality Plans**. Locality plans are in place for Auchenback and Arthurlie, Dunterlie and Dovecothall (ADD2Barrhead), and work is underway to develop a plan for Neilston. It was agreed that a proposal for future governance of Locality Plans would be circulated and developed further over the summer.

Community Planning Partners discussed performance against Strategic Outcome targets, for those indicators reported at end-year. Almost all the indicators are on target or have exceeded targets. There are a few indicators which are not performing as well as expected and the PAR had discussions around these and identified actions as appropriate. The PAR noted that this is the final report on this set of indicators as the CPP moves to monitoring progress against Community Plan and Fairer East Ren outcomes. The PAR reported performance by exception only:

- The indicators relating breastfeeding rates have been following a consistent trend with East Renfrewshire performing well against target although SIMD areas are below the local target and the Scottish average. The HSCP continues to work with NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde and public health colleagues to improve performance.
- East Renfrewshire has seen an improvement in the number of business that survive for at least three years

- There was a 60% increase in fire fatalities from the previous year, with 8 casualties, however the significant percentage increase is due to the small numbers involved and remains below target. End-year figures for crime rates and community safety are still to be confirmed.
- Performance is slightly below target in terms of the number of delayed discharges. It was noted that the target timescales have been become considerably tighter over the past five years and that the numbers reflect a small number of complex cases.

The PAR noted **East Renfrewshire Council's positive Best Value Assurance Report**. Published in November last year the report noted the good foundations on which to deliver the Community Empowerment Act and to build its approach to community engagement and participatory budgeting.

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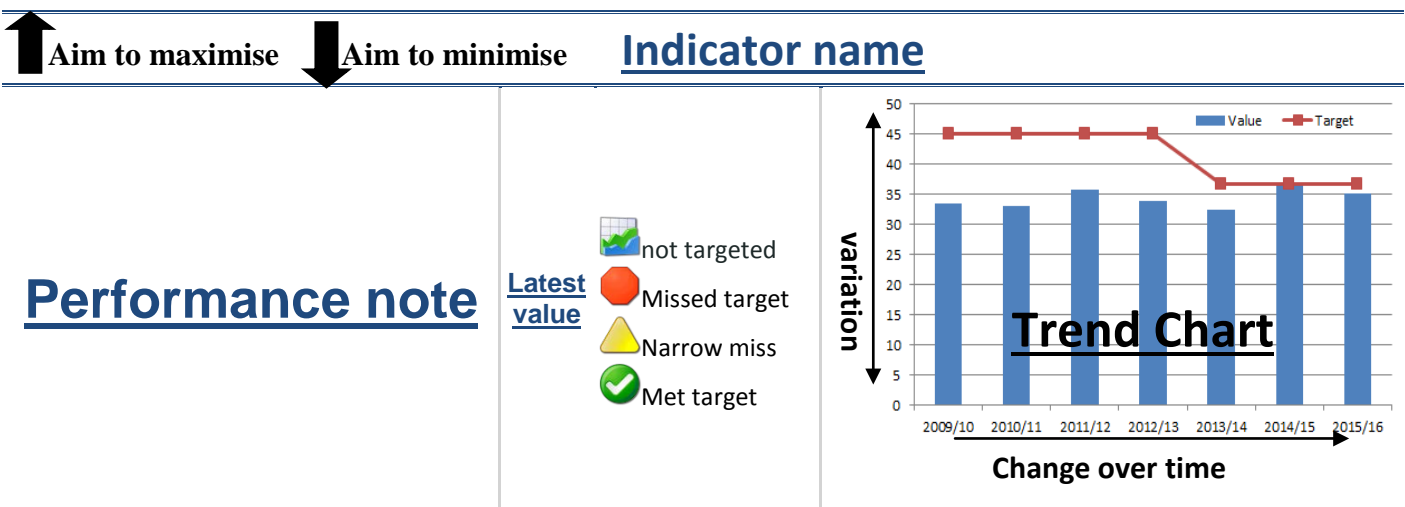

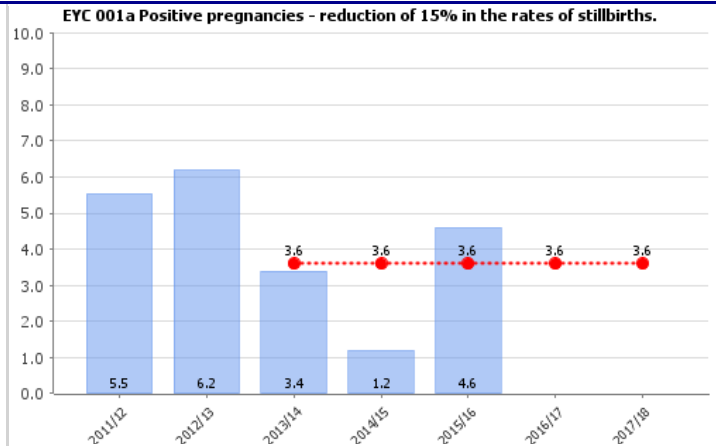

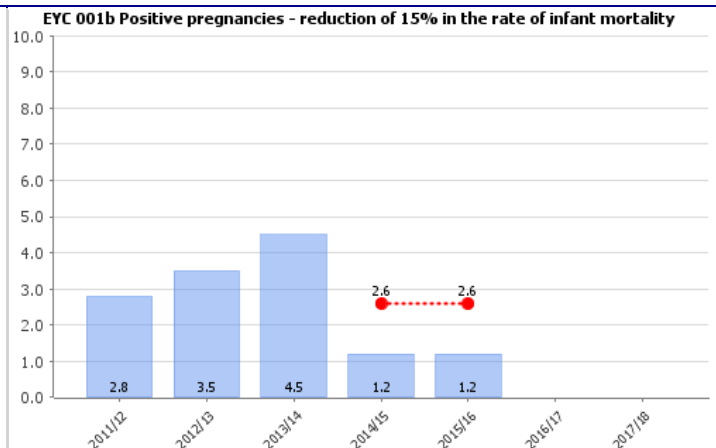

Latest data from National Records of Scotland (August 2017) show the infant mortality rate for the 2016 was 1.2 per 1,000 live births - this compares favourably to the Scottish national rate of 3.3 per 1,000 and the NHSGGC rate of 3 per 1,000. (21.03.18)

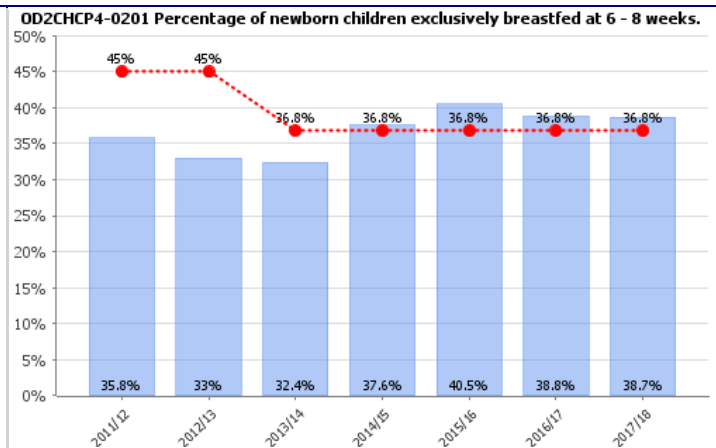

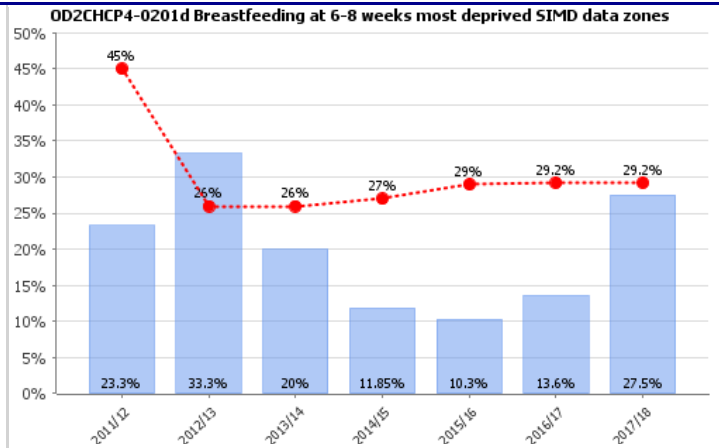

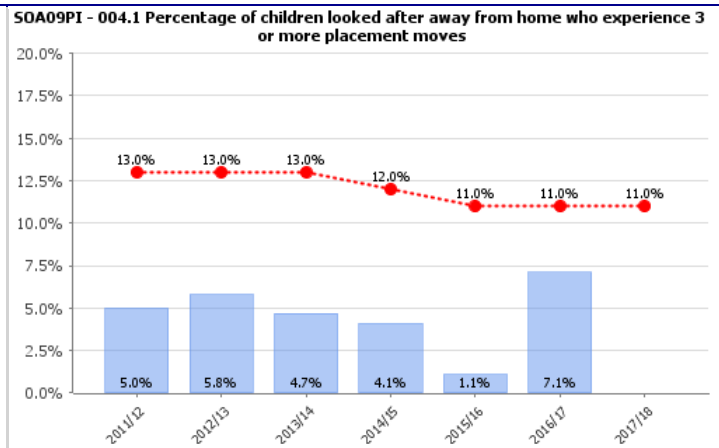


Percentage of children looked after away from home who experience 3 or more placement moves

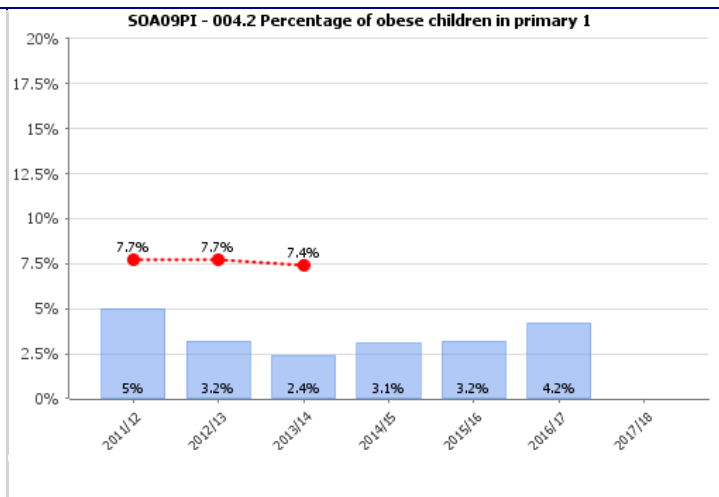

% of children reaching developmental milestones at 27-30 month child health review.

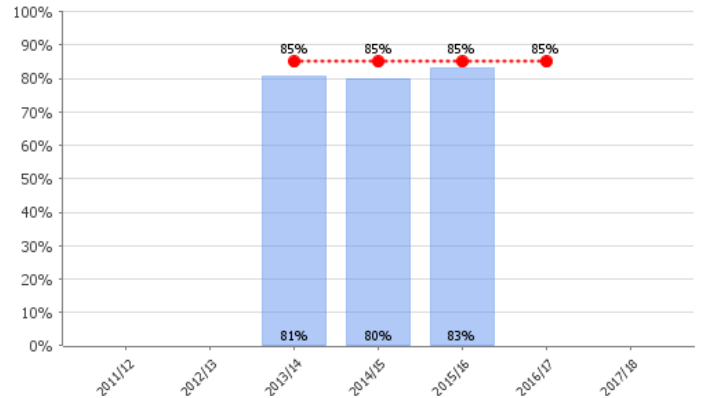

HSCP-LDP1718-C1 % of children reaching developmental milestones at 27-30 month child health review.



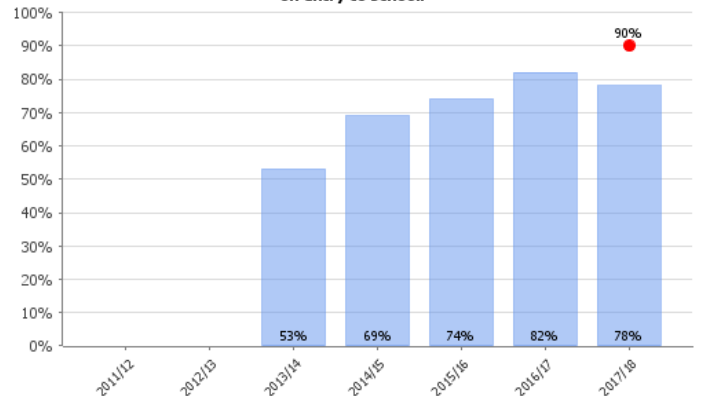

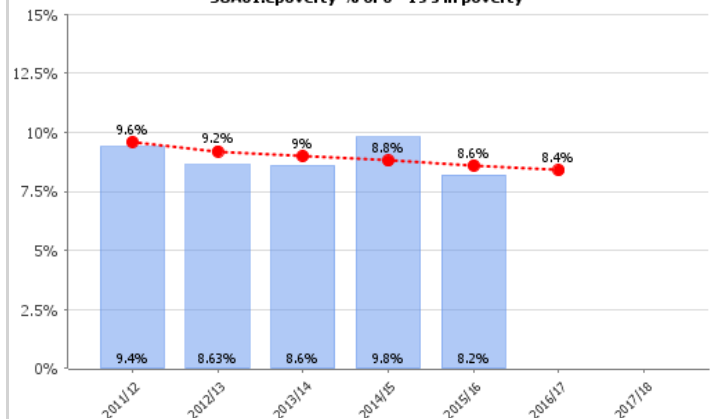

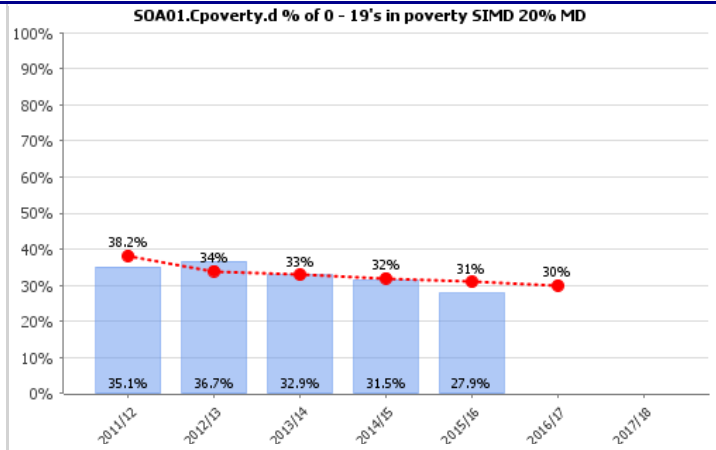

430 children (aged 0-19) in the 20% most deprived areas of Scotland within East Renfrewshire's boundary live in a low income household. This has reduced by around 70 children since the last release of HMRC statistics. However, when breaking these stats down to the 0-4 years age range, 65% or 230 0-4 year olds living in these 8 datazones (small areas) live in a low income household. Child poverty in the early years is associated with social disadvantage and poorer health outcomes in later life.

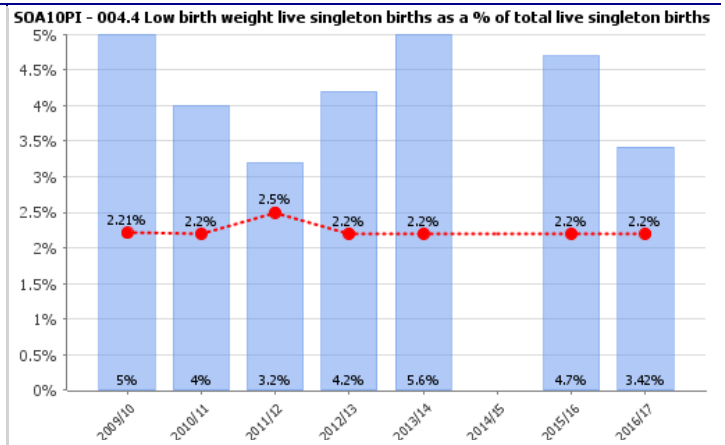

The percentage of babies born with a low birthweight (under 2,500 grammes) fell in the 2017 calendar year to 3.42% (29 of 847 births). Reasons for low birthweight are complex and relate to both deprivation and maternal age. The current target is recognised as very ambitious and will not continue into the next plan.

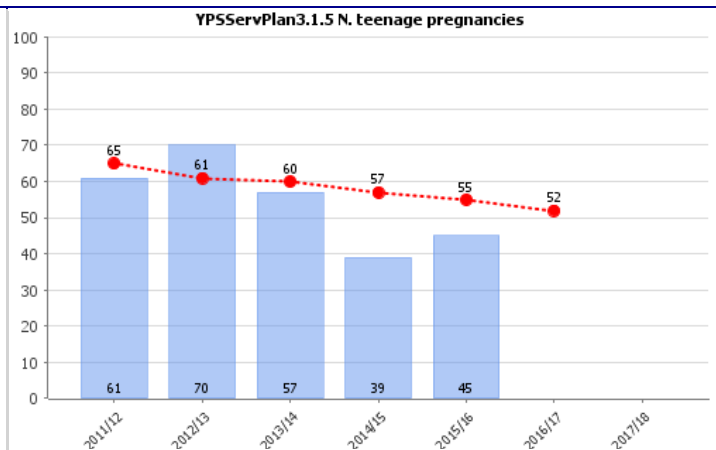


Number of teenage pregnancies

2015 data released summer 2017 due to data lags. There were 45 teenage pregnancies (females aged under 20) in the year 2015. This is a rate of 15.6% and is a slight increase on the previous year. East Renfrewshire recorded the lowest number of teenage pregnancies across Scotland and the 2nd lowest rate (per 1,000 females aged 20 or under) across Scotland's 32 local authority areas.

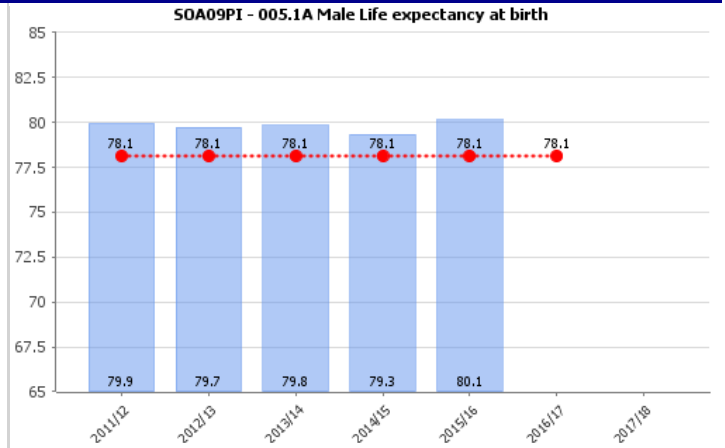

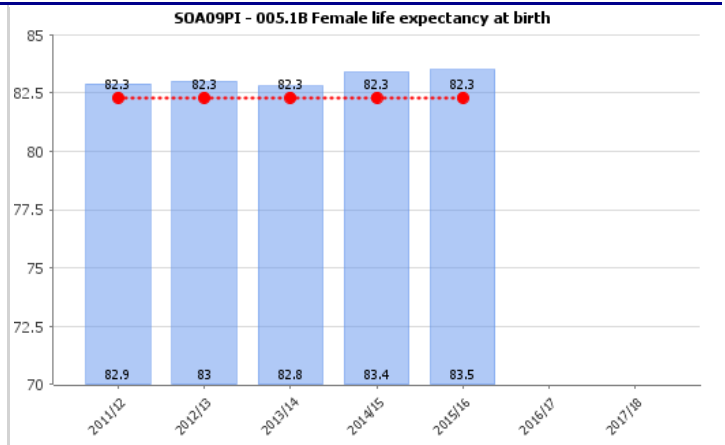

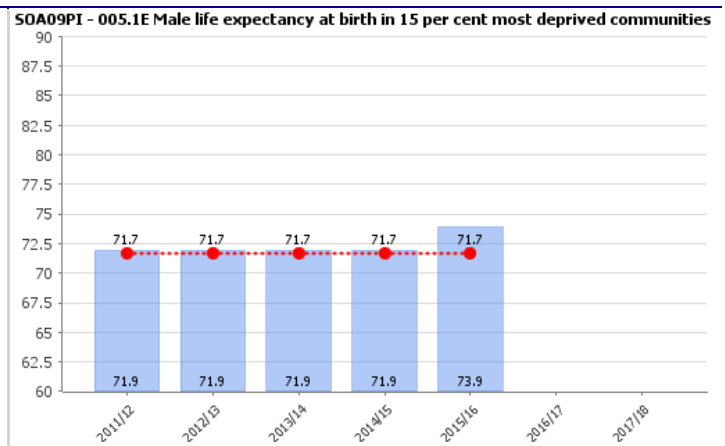

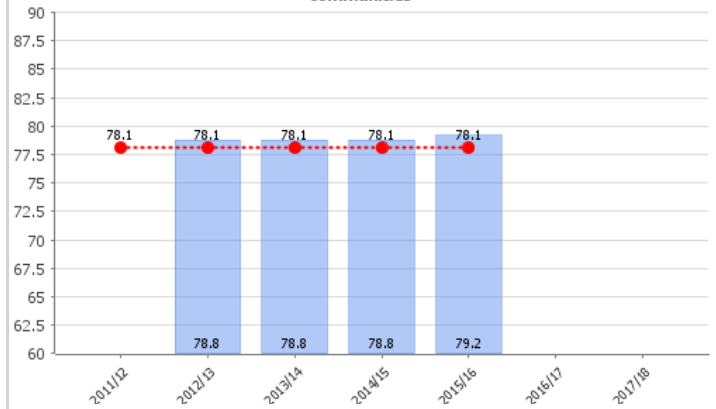

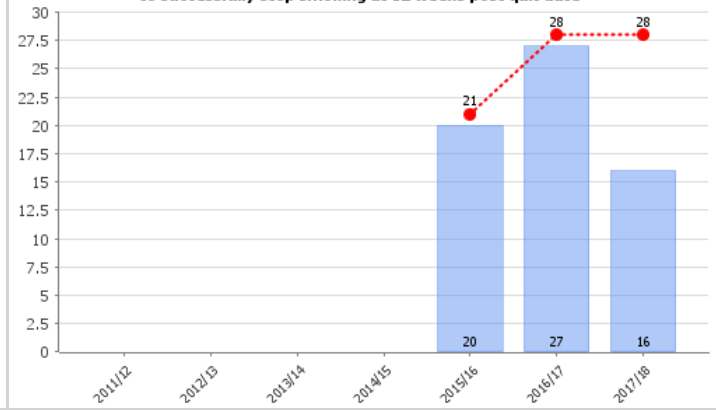

This brings the total to date at Q3 for 2107/18 to 16. Q4 data will not be available until July/Aug 2018. The target for first 3 quarters is 21 and is 28 for full year.

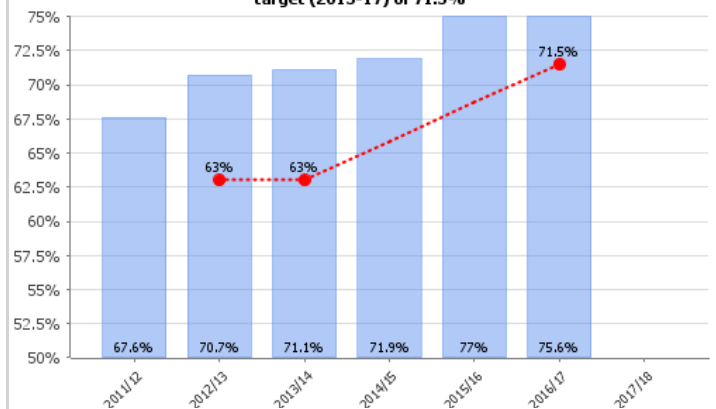

In 2016-17, the Council achieved its second best performance to date with 75.6% of S4 achieving 5+ at L5; this is a small decrease of 1.5% on our best ever performance in 2015-16 and is considerably higher (24.2%) than the Council's virtual comparator (51.3%) and the national average of 40.7%. Over the three year period (2015-17), the Council achieved an average of 74.9%; 3.4% above the target set for the same period.

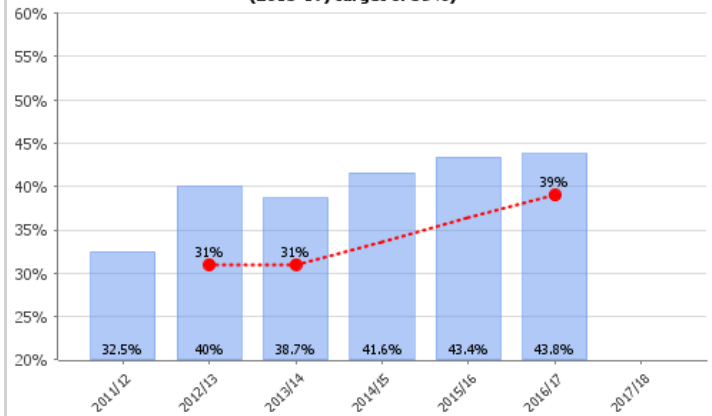

The proportion of S5 pupils achieving 5+ awards at level 6 or better has increased by 0.4%, the highest recorded. The Council's performance compares very favourably against the virtual comparator (26.9%) of S5 achieving 5+ at level 6 and the national average of 16.4%. The 3-year average for this measure was 43.1%; 4.1% above our target for the same period.

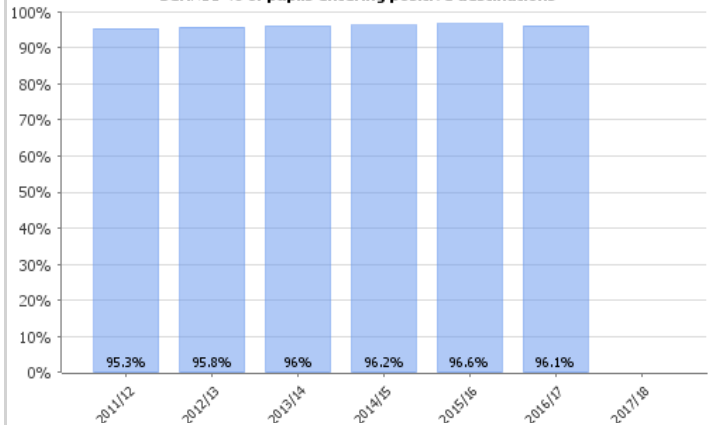

SCHN11 % of pupils entering positive destinations



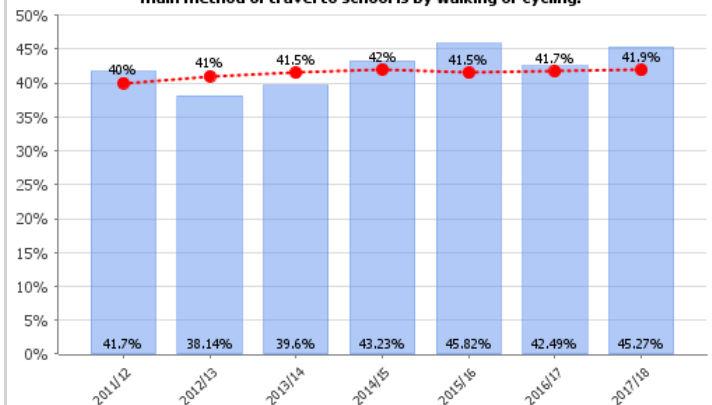

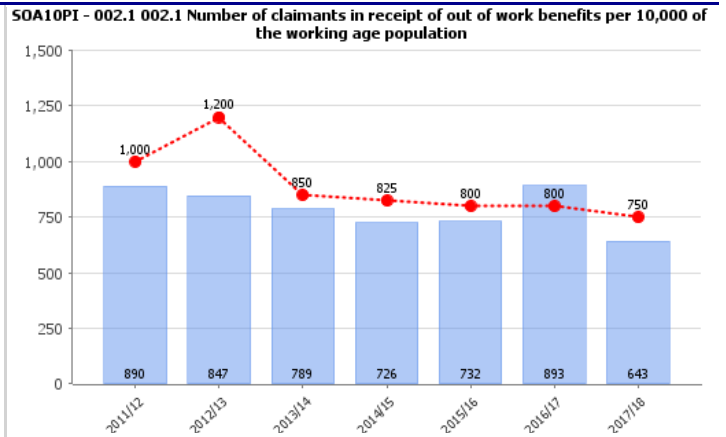

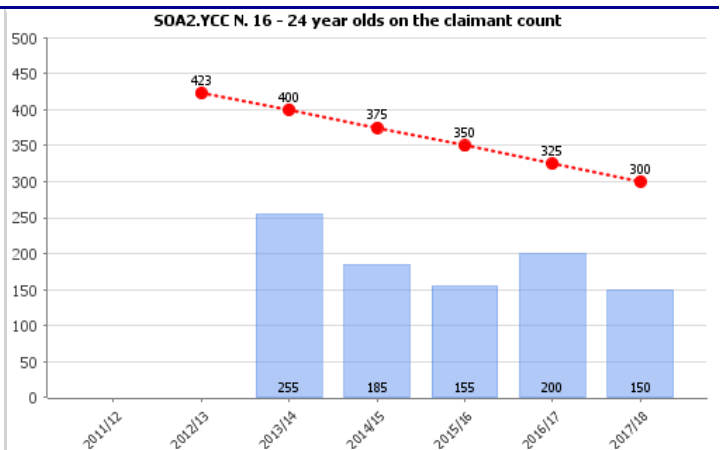

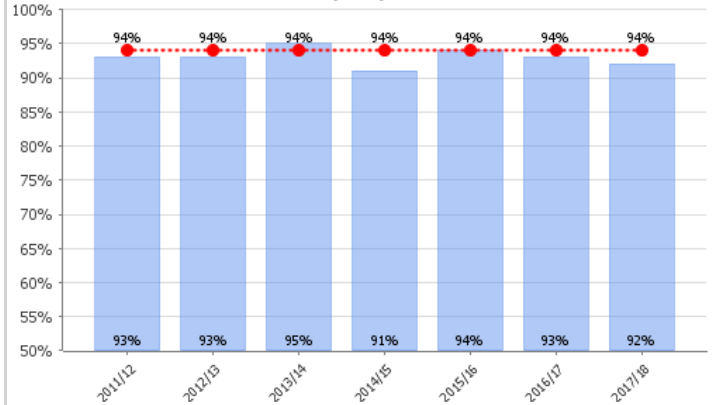
Citizens Panel - Satisfaction with East Renfrewshire as a place to live. (CORE)

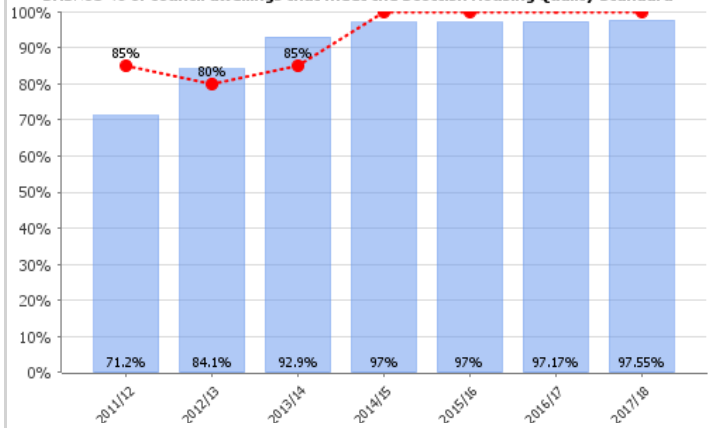

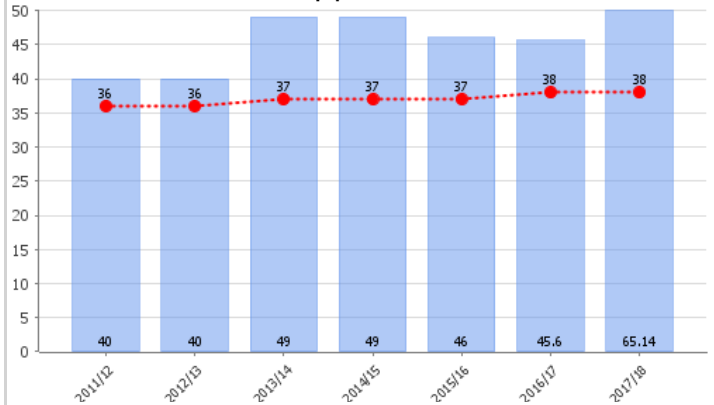
Number of new business births per 10,000 resident (16+) population

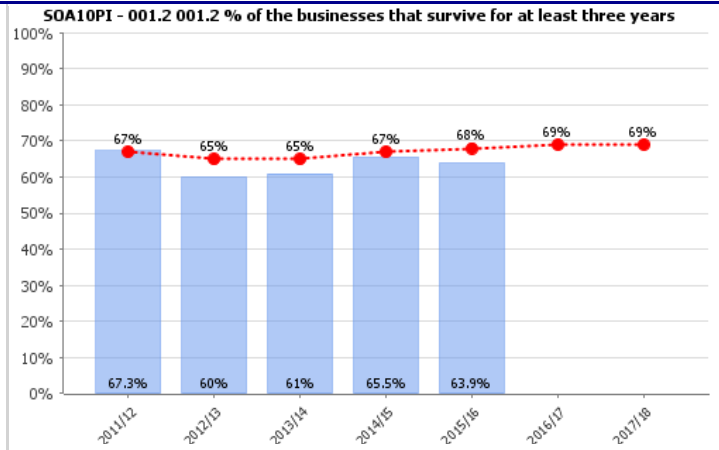
SOA10PI - 001.1 001.1 Number of new business births per 10,000 resident (16+) population

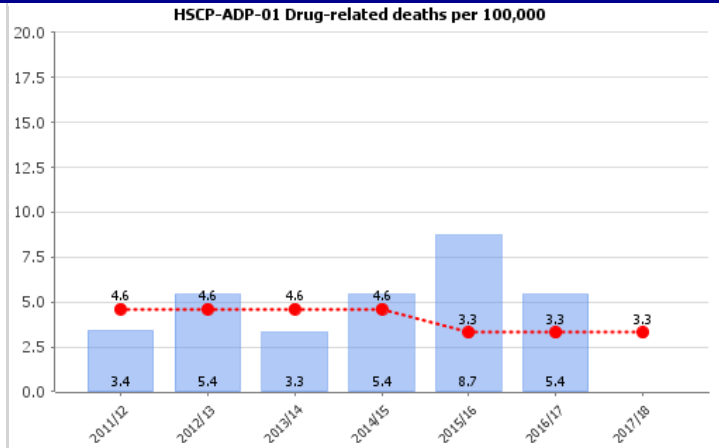

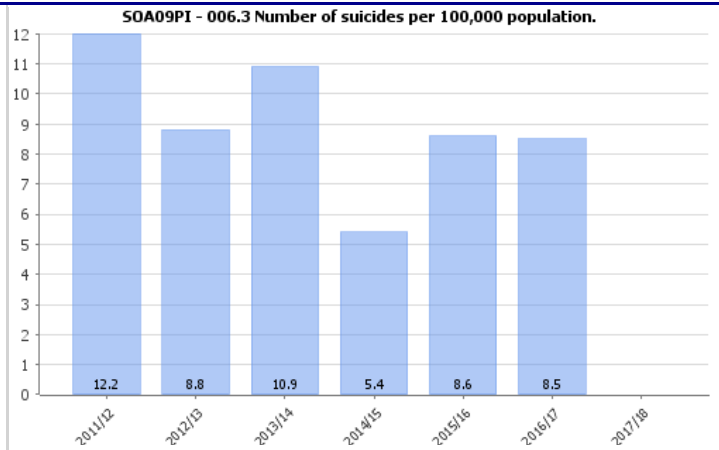

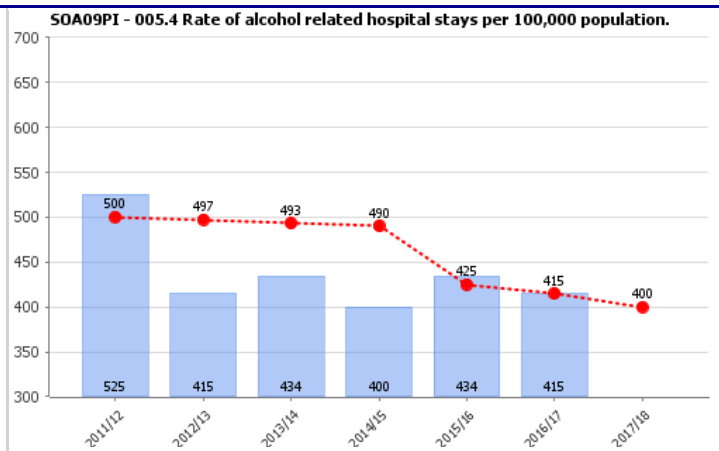

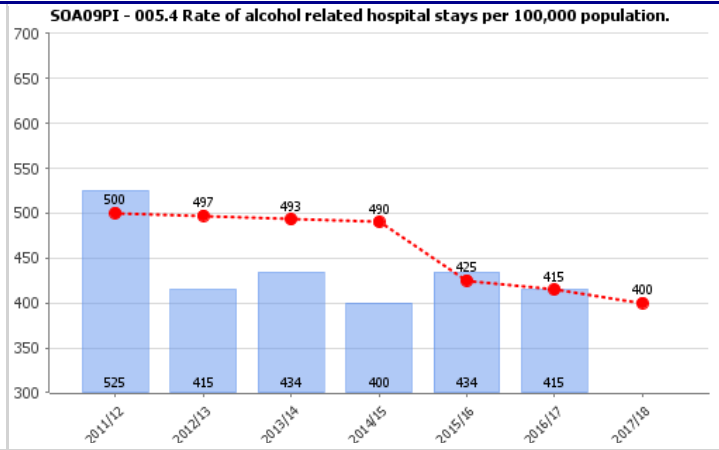

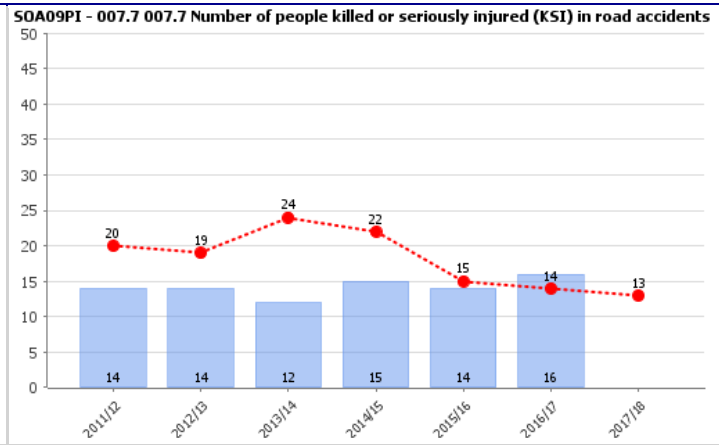


Number of people killed or seriously injured (KSI) in road accidents

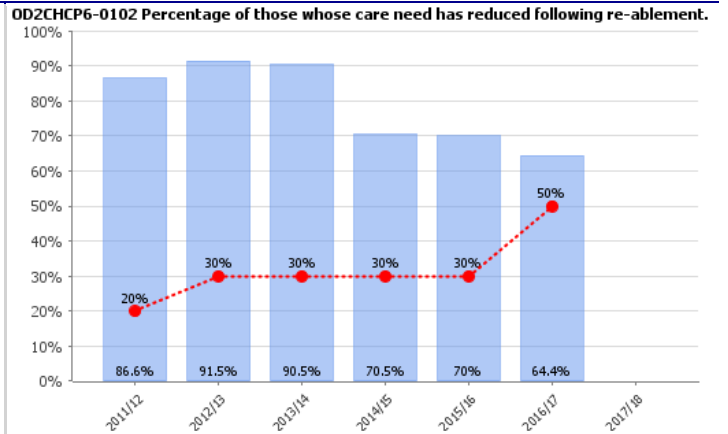


Percentage of those whose care need has reduced following re-ablement.

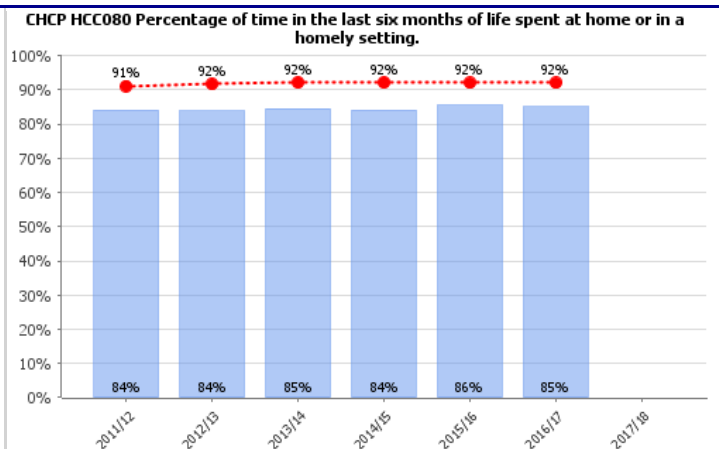

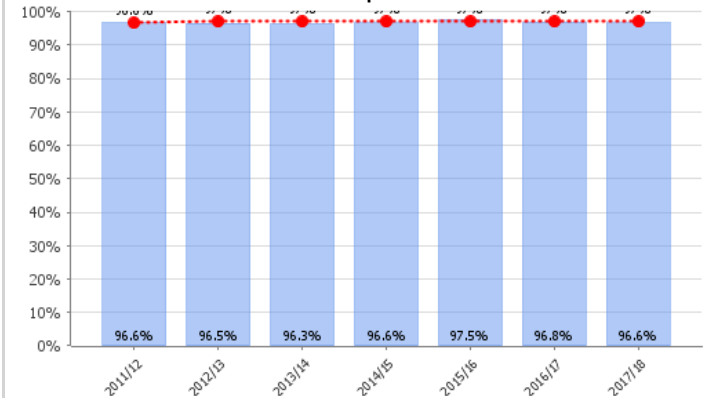
Percentage of people aged 65+ who live in housing rather than a care home or hospital

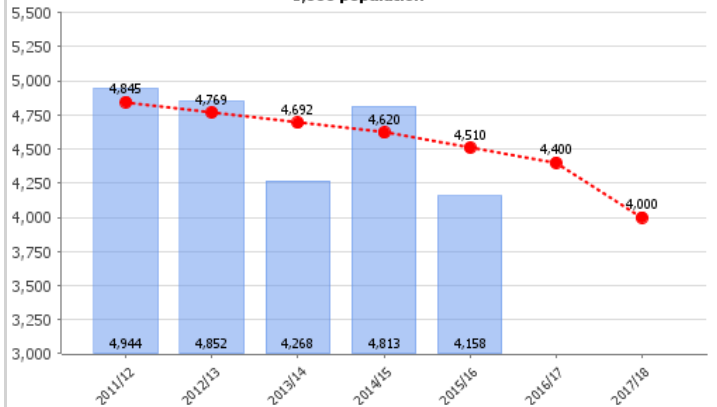
