POLICE SCOTLAND GREATER GLASGOW DIVISION REPORT TO EAST RENFREWSHIRE CABINET POLICE PERFORMANCE OVER THE 2nd QUARTER OF FINANCIAL YEAR 2017/2018

Purpose of Report

The purpose of this report is to update members of East Renfrewshire Cabinet on police performance over the second quarter of the financial year 2017/2018. This narrative should be considered in conjunction with the accompanying Local Authority Scrutiny Board statistical report detailed in Appendix 1 at the end of this document.

Local Management

Chief Superintendent Brian McInulty continues as Divisional Commander of Greater Glasgow Division.

Chief Inspector Angela Carty continues as Area Commander, East Renfrewshire supported by Deputy Area Commander Inspector John McQuilter and Constable Jacqueline Petrie, Local Authority Liaison Officer.

East Renfrewshire Policing Plan 2014-2017

The priorities within the policing plan were identified through engagement and consultation across East Renfrewshire. The results of our annual community consultation combined with crime analysis and resource demands have led to the following priorities being identified:-

- 1. Tackling Violence, Disorder and Anti-social Behaviour.
- 2. Protecting People.
- 3. Increasing Public Confidence and Local Engagement.
- 4. Tackling Serious Crimes and Responding to Major Events.

Introduction

As your Local Police Commander I am pleased to present this year's second quarterly update on the East Renfrewshire Local Policing Plan. The Policing Plan outlines our commitment to tackling the issues most concerning to communities in East Renfrewshire.

As you will be aware the Policing Plan 2017-2020 was agreed at the last meeting of the Police and Fire Cabinet on 21 September 2017 and was remitted to Full Council for sign off on 25 October 2017. The new Policing Plan is now in place and as such this will be the last update which reports against the Policing Plan 2014-2017 priorities.

Local Policing Priorities 2017-2020 have been identified as:

Homes being broken into
Antisocial behaviour and disorder
Violent crime
Drug dealing and misuse
Child abuse including child sexual exploitation

<u>Summary of Performance – April to September</u>

Tackling Violence, Disorder and Antisocial Behaviour

We continue to focus on preventing violence, disorder and antisocial behaviour. Our objectives included a commitment to:

- Reduce violent crime including alcohol related violence
- Increase detections of violent offenders including those who commit domestic abuse and hate crime
- Reduce the number of assaults
- Reduce the number of complaints regarding anti-social behaviour including disorderly conduct and drunk in public

We have seen a significant rise in the numbers of complaints of antisocial behaviour in the community. These incidents are not specific to any one place, the effects being felt across the entire local authority. It is worth noting that while reported antisocial behaviour has risen there has been a similar increase in vandalism and assaults. Our officers remain focussed on tackling antisocial behaviour as an effective way of impacting on vandalism and assaults.

An action plan under the name of Operation Scythe was initiated and brought together officers form our Local Problem Solving Teams, Divisional Violence Reduction Unit, Mounted Branch, Local Policing Team and our partners from

East Renfrewshire wardens and CCTV. While this enforcement action is concentrated in reducing the numbers of calls and detecting offenders it is important to note that it is part of an approach which includes education. Campus officers continue to be engaged in presentations to young people in schools about the effects antisocial behaviour has on communities.

LOCAL POLICING PLAN PRIORITY 2 – PROTECTING PEOPLE

Our commitment to tackling all forms of abuse continues.

Our objectives include a commitment to:

- Work with partner agencies to support victims of domestic abuse
- Encourage victims and witnesses to report all incidents of hate crime to help stop hatred motivated by prejudice and discrimination
- Achieve national targets in respect of all Multi Agency Public Protection Arrangements
- Reduce road deaths and serious injuries
- Improve road user behaviour through enforcement of legislation
- Reduce the number of housebreakings

We have remained focused on dealing quickly and effectively with incidences of domestic abuse compared to the same period last year, the number of domestic abuse crimes has reduced whilst the proportion of offenders detected has increased. While this is very positive, we have to be satisfied that any reduction in numbers is not the result of a loss of confidence in reporting, and that we maintain our focus and commitment to supporting victims of domestic abuse. A review of the process by which we refer vulnerable victims of domestic abuse to ASSIST has ensured that victims get access to support as soon as possible.

Greater Glasgow's Public Protection Unit 'Non Recent Investigation Unit', is a team of specialist officers who are dedicated to engaging and investigating reports of non-recent sexual abuse. The team are working closely with Rape Crisis Scotland to ensure victims are receiving the appropriate support. Due to the success of this team, it has recently been expanded and now incorporates additional specialist officers to effectively progress significant investigations. The Unit has received positive feedback from partners and victims.

Tackling sexual abuse and the exploitation of children and vulnerable people remains a key priority. The Child Abuse Investigation Unit (CAIU) are currently undertaking significant work in relation to the identification and investigation of instances of Child Sexual Exploitation. The year to date number of reported sexual crimes remains consistent at 45 compared to last year.

Child abuse and child sexual exploitation has been highlighted by communities as a priority area for policing in the coming months and years. Some concerns arise out of the information that children and young people are exposed to on the internet. Our campus officers are providing guidance and advice on internet safety and cyber bullying to secondary school pupils.

We continue to see a reduction in the numbers of homes being broken into showing 8 fewer victims. In addition there has been an increase in the number of people reported to the Procurator Fiscal for these crimes. It is important to recognise that the reduction in the number of housebreakings, that are recorded in line with Scottish Crime Recording Standards, where the security of a building is overcome, has to be viewed alongside increasing numbers of sneak in thefts where houses have not been secured and perpetrators are able to get into houses through unlocked doors. We have been promoting crime prevention messages through social media and community councils and continue encourage residents to keep themselves and their property safe.

LOCAL POLICING PLAN PRIORITY 3 – INCREASE PUBLIC CONFIDENCE AND LOCAL ENGAGEMENT

To ensure that we maintain public confidence we are committed to listening to local people. Our objectives include a commitment to:-

- Report on performance measured against the local priorities identified by the public
- Maintain high levels of public confidence in policing
- Actively engage with local communities
- Maintain high standards of professional conduct

Our 'Your View Counts' survey was refreshed and relaunched in August this year, changing the way we carry out our public consultation. The digital online survey which can be accessed at any time, contains 27 questions and takes on average about 15 minutes to complete.

As part of 'Your View Counts', members of the community are given the opportunity to provide their views on both local and national priorities. In September 2016, a Polish language version of the survey was launched. Other engagement activities have been planned each month with different communities to encourage participation across our diverse population, with responses being recorded in all the city's Multi-Member Ward areas. The first

12 months of results from the previous survey have now been published and form the foundations on which our 2017–2020 Policing Plan.

In addition to this, we continue to undertake regular customer satisfaction surveys with over 150 people every month who have reported crimes or incidents to us. This helps us monitor public satisfaction and confidence, whilst ensuring that people receive an excellent policing service in Glasgow. Overall, public confidence in Greater Glasgow Division remains high, at 73.4% in Q2 and 75.2% of respondents rating their satisfaction with the service as either high or very high.

As Local Policing Commander, my recently launched Twitter account '@ChSuptMcInulty' has allowed me to provide regular updates on policing issues and local events. As a division, we will continue to exploit every means available to improve local engagement in Glasgow.

Our satisfaction rates remain favourable and we continue to work to improve our service. We welcome comment from those who come into contact with us and from communities on how we can further improve.

LOCAL POLICING PLAN PRIORITY 4 – TACKLING SERIOUS CRIME AND NATIONAL EVENTS

Tackling serious and organised crime remains one of our key priorities. Our objectives included a commitment to:

- Work with partners to deprive organised crime groups access to financial gains, achieved through legitimate enterprises; and
- Target organised crime groups through proceeds of crime legislation
- Disrupt the supply of drugs into communities

Between July and September, 145 individuals linked to SAOC were arrested which resulted in a total of 223 offences being reported in the Greater Glasgow Division. Officers have continued to exploit the Proceeds of Crime Act to deprive criminals of cash and assets obtained illegally. So far this year we have seized in the region of £876,000 in cash and assets.

Greater Glasgow's Serious and Organised Crime Teams have been focused upon a number of operations that have had an impact throughout the division and further afield. This has involved surveillance operations, which has resulted in a greater understanding of those involved and of those who pose the greatest harm to our local communities.

In September 2017 officers from our Serious and Organised Crime Teams gave a presentation to councillors on the work they do and how it affects local communities.

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We remain focussed on reducing the availability of drugs in our communities and on acting robustly when information identifies such criminality. So far this year we have executed 13 drugs warrants in East Renfrewshire.

Conclusion

As Local Police Commander, I am delighted to present this second update on our policing activities and to share some of the really positive outcomes that have been achieved. Notwithstanding these successes, I am aware of the challenges we face in terms of addressing the areas where outcomes need to improve. I remain confident that if we are to achieve our common aim of keeping people safe in Glasgow, then it is absolutely critical that we continue to work together to get the most from our shared resources. The progress made to date has been impressive but none of it would have been possible without us working together.
