Ambitious projects on track

- Delivering services which matter the most
- Six new nurseries and superb new primary school
- Residents move into first of 240 new council houses
- Extra spending on improving local roads
- More investment in facilities for older people
- Significant financial challenges



Our Grant Settlement from the Scottish Government for 2020/21

- Grant had been expected to be £189.4m but will now rise
- We now anticipate a like-for-like flat cash settlement compared to last year
- Welcome extra £8.5m for education and social care
- 60% of our Budget ring-fenced for national spending plans
- Only 19% of our income comes from council tax



Addressing the Budget challenge

- An anticipated Budget shortfall of just over £18m will now be slightly smaller
- Shortfall will be tackled by savings, reserves and Council Tax
- Savings include less money devolved to schools, less support for some pupils and less money for leisure trust
- £3.5m from reserves will go towards closing the budget gap but our reserves are getting smaller every year
- Council Tax will be increased by 4.84% and bring in an extra £2.7m to head off further savings in education, roads and parks



What we are expecting from the Scottish Government for 2021/22

- We will balance the books for 2020/21 but significant challenges lie ahead
- East Renfrewshire is already facing a Budget shortfall of £12.4m for 2021/22 and more difficult decisions required
- Delay in UK Government funding has not helped long-term financial planning
- Council expects to approve three-year Budget next year



Addressing the savings challenge

- We are increasing efficiencies and streamlining processes to reduce the impact savings have on frontline services
- Modernisation of our computer services is boosting efficiency and a new Council website will improve digital access for residents
- In the last three years 67% of required savings have come from efficiencies across the Council



Major investment in our communities

- £209m will be spent on a range of ambitious capital plans over the next ten years
- Two-thirds of that money will be spent in next three years with many projects already nearing completion
- Delivering these projects will tackle head-on the issues which matter the most to people in East Renfrewshire
- The Council remains committed to improving the lives of all of our residents




East Renfrewshire continues to have the lowest levels of crime in mainland Scotland and 95% of our residents are satisfied with the area as a place to live.

Recommendations

- (i) approves the revenue estimates for 2020/2021;

- (iii) approves the recommended level and use of reserves;
- (iv) determines the Council Tax Band D level for 2020/2021 at £1,289.96; and
- (v) notes that management of the Council's finances and service plans will continue to be undertaken on a longer-term basis.
