Integrated Children's Services Plan 2013-16 Year 1 Report

PURPOSE OF REPORT

1. To present to Cabinet the Integrated Children's Services Plan 2013-16 Year 1 Report.

RECOMMENDATIONS

2. The Cabinet is asked to note the contents of the Integrated Children's Services Plan 2013-16 Year 1 Action and Performance Reports.

BACKGROUND

3. Getting It Right for East Renfrewshire's Children and Young People 2013-2016 is the integrated children's services plan for children, young people and families in East Renfrewshire. This fourth integrated plan encompasses the vision and strategy of the Integrated Children's Services Planning Core Group for the period 2013-2016 and represents East Renfrewshire's long established commitment to achieve better integrated service planning and delivery for children, young people and families.

4. Following a review of our priorities in 2013 we agreed our vision, aim, and outcomes for children's services for the period 2013-16. The new outcomes reflect those adopted by the Scottish Government's *Getting It Right For Every Child* national programme that all children and young people should be *safe, healthy, active, nurtured, achieving, respected/responsible, and included.* These outcomes are commonly referred to as SHANARRI.

REPORTS

5. The Integrated Children's Plan Year 1 Reports set out what has been achieved in East Renfrewshire over the year 20013/14 in relation to key activities and actions along with the performance of services measured against agreed indicators. All progress is measured in respect of the SHANARRI outcomes. The SHANARRI outcomes are defined in the following way:

6. As the SHANARRI outcomes are linked to locally agreed SOA, progress made as a consequence of the children's services plan also contributes towards the achievement of East Renfrewshire's Single Outcome Agreement 2013-16.

7. As the children's services plan is an integrated plan commitments outlined for the next year will be reviewed by individual departments and services as part of budgetary review process. Services will share budget decisions that may impact on the plan, with the core group.

CONSULTATION

9. The production of the Year 1 Reports have involved a process of extensive collaborative working between partners within the five multi agency thematic planning groups – *Additional Support Needs, Early Years, Looked After Children, Young People, and Keeping Children Safe.* East Renfrewshire Council – Chief Executive's and Education Services, the Community Health and Care Partnership, NHS Greater Glasgow & Clyde, and a range of other agencies including the Scottish Children's Reporter Administration, Skills Development Scotland, and partners in voluntary organisations are all represented on the thematic groups.

PARTNERSHIP WORKING

10. The Integrated Children's Services Planning Core Group is the principal multi agency group that has responsibility for joint strategic planning and development of integrated services for children, young people, and families in East Renfrewshire. The Core Group oversees the work of the five multi agency thematic planning sub groups as well as the development and publication of the Children's Services Plan and annual reviews.
